Student Government Scholarship

This SGA scholarship is intended to award the most qualified applicant that shows the most aptitude for campus and community involvement. Applicants must take at least nine credit hours per semester, except during the summer sessions, with a minimum 2.7 GPA. The total amount of the scholarship is \$1000.00, for which the recipient will have two options for payment. The recipient may be paid either \$500.00 in the fall and again in the spring semester, or \$400.00 in the fall and again in the spring, with the remaining \$200.00 paid in during the summer. School of Arts and Letters

IUS Writing Contest

The IUS Writing Contest accepts submissions from all majors across campus in Research Writing, Short Non-fiction, Short Fiction, and Poetry; monetary awards accompany First, Second, and Third Place winners. The awards are presented in December of each year, at the annual English Student Gala <http://www.ius.edu/ArtsandLetters/Publications.cfm>.

Metroversity Writing Awards

The Metroversity Writing Awards accepts submissions annually from all students and also has four categories: poems, short stories, essays, and research papers. IUS Review

The IUS Review accepts work from all writers, but makes a pointed effort to generate submissions from current IUS students. Students edit the Review itself, overseeing all aspects of its publication. Rasmussen Theatre Awards

The one-year Rasmussen Theatre Awards provide qualified students with the equivalent of up to 15 credit hours of in-state tuition and fees. These awards, which are also available in music, are renewable. Applicants need not be Indiana state residents; however, the tuition and fee waiver cannot exceed that of 15 credit hours in-state per semester. Please note: residents of Bullitt, Jefferson, and Oldham counties in Kentucky are considered in-state residents. The Dr. Carol Bishop Scholarship

Dr. Carol Bishop was a Professor of English at Indiana University Southeast for many years. Before she died in the Spring of 1996, several of her colleagues and friends approached her about the idea of a scholarship for English majors to be given in her name. More than anything else in her life, Dr. Bishop loved to teach literature. She approved of this scholarship and specified the conditions under which it should be awarded. A very generous donation from Carol Bishop's family, supplemented by other donations from previous students, her friends, and her colleagues, makes this scholarship of \$1,000 possible. Music Department

The Rasmussen Scholarship Awards for Performing Arts in Music

The Rasmussen Scholarship Awards are given to outstanding students in the performing arts. Auditions usually take place in the spring and occasionally once in the summer. It is to the student's advantage to apply early since funds vary from year to year. Award amounts usually range from \$500 to \$1500 and carry specific responsibilities based on the student's talents. Usually these responsibilities include ensemble performance or ensemble and studio accompanying. Awards are divided over the course of the Fall and Spring semesters. Since these are single year awards, students wishing to renew their award must re-audition. See this site for details <http://www.ius.edu/Music/>.

The Martha Stem Scholarship in Music

The Martha Stem Scholarship is funded by an endowment given to Indiana University Southeast by Mr. Richard K. Stem in memory of his mother. It is a merit-based award given annually to two outstanding students; one in music and one in fine arts. It is given to one incoming freshman each year. The Martha Stem Award in Music is intended to strengthen and support the music program at Indiana University Southeast by covering full tuition, book and fee expenses for up to four years. The Award in Music is reserved for music majors only. Fine Arts applicants should contact the Fine Arts Department for information.

The students who qualify will be awarded funds that will pay full tuition up to 30 credit hours per academic year and will cover all expenses incurred through required books, and applied music fees. As long as the student is in good standing, the award will be renewed for up to four years without audition or reapplication. See this site for details <http://www.ius.edu/Music/>.

The Poteet Scholarship Award for Performance on a Band Instrument

The Schansberg Scholarship for Orchestral String Performance

The Schansberg Award is given annually to one outstanding performer on an orchestral stringed instrument (violin, viola, cello, or double bass). The Award amount is \$500. Research Funding

Applied Research and Education Center

The Applied Research and Education Center (AREC) is a non-profit team of IU Southeast faculty and students that respond to requests from community and neighborhood based organizations to research and solve complex social-ecological problems.

The AREC conducts studies, evaluations and needs assessments for agencies whose concerns include domestic violence, educational opportunities, workforce preparedness, housing needs, recreation and leisure opportunities, aging, transportation, childcare and community growth and development.

Undergraduate Research/Creative Work Fellowships

Fellowships of \$1,000 are awarded each semester to allow students to carry out major independent projects under the supervision of a faculty mentor.

All IUS undergraduate students, regardless of discipline, number of hours completed or part-or full-time status, are eligible to apply. Selection will be made on the basis of quality of proposal and letter of support from a faculty mentor who has agreed to supervise the project if funded. Travel

STUDENT TRAVEL AWARDS

Student Travel Awards provide partial support for students who have the opportunity to participate in a student or professional meeting. Funds are limited and awarded competitively.

Guidelines:

- Students requesting funds must be an active participant either by presenting a paper or original work, participating on a panel at a conference, performing in an artistic fashion, or participating in presentation of faculty sponsor's work.
- Students are expected to share in the cost; no trip can be funded at 100%. Car-pooling and room sharing are encouraged.
- The student must turn in original receipts to the Office of Academic Affairs no later than 5 working days from the date of the trip. Funds can be paid directly to the meeting account. All payments to students will be made on a reimbursement basis.

Student Travel Funds for Learning Enrichment

Students must be ACTIVE participants either by presenting a paper or original work, participating on a panel at a conference, or performing in an artistic fashion, and be affiliated with an academic course or academic research. Students may be funded up to \$300 per academic year. It is important to note that the earlier the travel request is submitted, the more likely it is that funding will be awarded.
