Fall 2010 Campus Profile: Purpose & Highlights

Purpose:

The Campus Profile report provides a snapshot of the students currently enrolled at the institution. This report should be used to make decisions about planning and programs in response to changes in the student body. Trend data are provided where appropriate to demonstrate characteristic shifts over time.

Highlights:

- Enrollment headcount has increased each year since 2006, with an increase of 5% between each of the last two years (Fall 2009 & Fall 2010). Overall, headcount has increased 16% since 2006.
- Enrollment FTE has also increased each year since 2006, with an increase of more than five percent between 2009 and 2010. Overall, FTE has increased 20% since over the last 5 years.
- As with headcount and FTE, enrollment hours have increased each year since 2006, with an increase of nearly 6% between 2009 and 2010. Overall, hours have increased by 20% since 2006.
- Most students attending in Fall 2010 were retained from the previous spring term (63%). Some students (3%) attended in Fall 2009 but did not attend in Spring 2010.
- Like undergraduates, most graduate students attending in Fall 2010 were retained from the previous spring term (64%). Some students (5%) attended in Fall 2009 but did not attend in Spring 2010.
- In 2006, full-time students outnumbered part-time students by 7%. The ratio of full-time to part-time has grown steadily in favor of full-time students over the last five years, with 16% more full-time than part-time students enrolled in Fall 2010.
- In 2006, reciprocity students made up 25% of the student body, while residential students made up 74%. The number of reciprocity students has grown each year since 2006 and accounted for 30% of the student body in Fall 2010.
- In Fall 2010, 69% of undergraduate and 81% of graduate students lived in Clark (IN), Floyd (IN), or Jefferson (KY) county. Jefferson (KY) was the county of highest residence for graduate students (49%), while Clark (IN) was that of undergraduate students (24%).
- Although the gender ratio has favored females for the last five years, the percentage of male students has gradually increased 3% during that time to make up 40% of the student body in Fall 2010.
- The percentage of IU Southeast students who report white as their ethnicity has decreased nearly 5% since 2006. That decrease is accounted for by a nearly 2% increase in Hispanic students, a 1% increase in African American students, and slight increases in Asian American, and Foreign students. The addition of the “Two or More Races” category in 2010 accounts for the drop in “Other” students for Fall 2010.
- The percentage of first-time freshmen reported as first generation students has increased 10% since 2006, with nearly half of the Fall 2010 freshmen reported as first generation.
- The percentage of transfer students reported as first generation has also increased (8%) since 2006, with nearly 40% of Fall 2010 transfers reported as first generation.
- The majority (64%) of all undergraduates are full-time across all schools. The School of Education and Academic Success Center have the largest percentage of full-time students with 80% and 71%, respectively.
- In contrast to undergraduates, the majority (90%) of IU Southeast graduate students are enrolled part-time.
- The Majority of IU Southeast undergraduates (64%) are between the ages of 18 and 24. Less than 20% are age 30 or over.
- In contrast to undergraduates, 52% of graduate students are over 30 years of age. Less than 15% are under age 25.

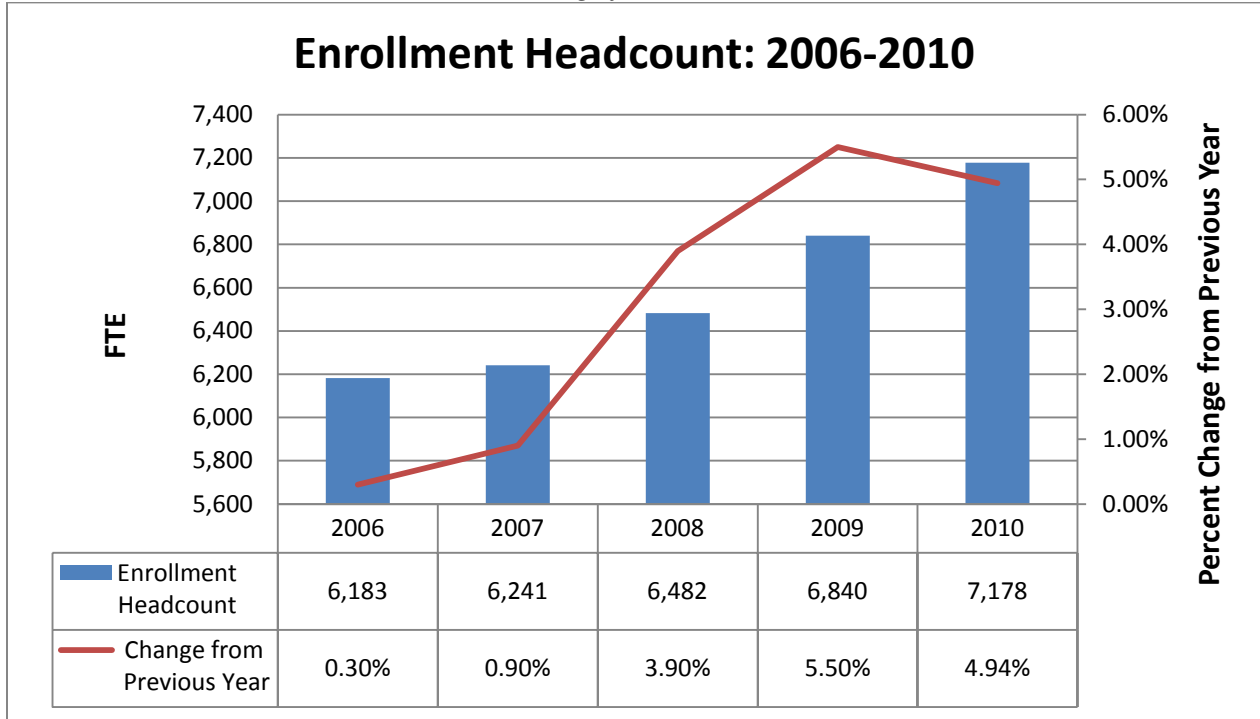
- First-time freshmen enrollment has increased by 20% since 2006, with the largest increase (28%) between Fall 2007 and Fall 2008.
- The majority (45%) of the 680 IU Southeast students who submitted SAT scores were in the 900-1099 range, while another 35% scored in the 700-899 range.
- Half of the 113 students who submitted scores from the ACT scored at least a 20 on the test, while another 39% scored in the 15 to 19 range.
- More than 55% of first-time freshmen entered IU Southeast with at least a 2.9 high school GPA.
- Most first-time freshmen (89%) are enrolled full-time. Other than those undecided, the top three majors in terms of enrollment are Nursing, Elementary Education, and Biology.
- Twenty-six high schools account for 67% of the first-time freshman cohort. Floyd Central, New Albany, and Jeffersonville High schools account for 25% of the cohort.
- Although females outnumber males for most ethnic groups, the disparity is much larger for African American students. Nearly 40% of white students are male, whereas only 22% of African American students are male.
- Nearly all first-time freshmen (94%) are 23 years of age or less.
- In 2006, reciprocity students made up 12% of first-time Freshman, while residential students made up 87%. The number of reciprocity students has grown each year since 2006 and account for 23% of first-time freshmen in Fall 2010.

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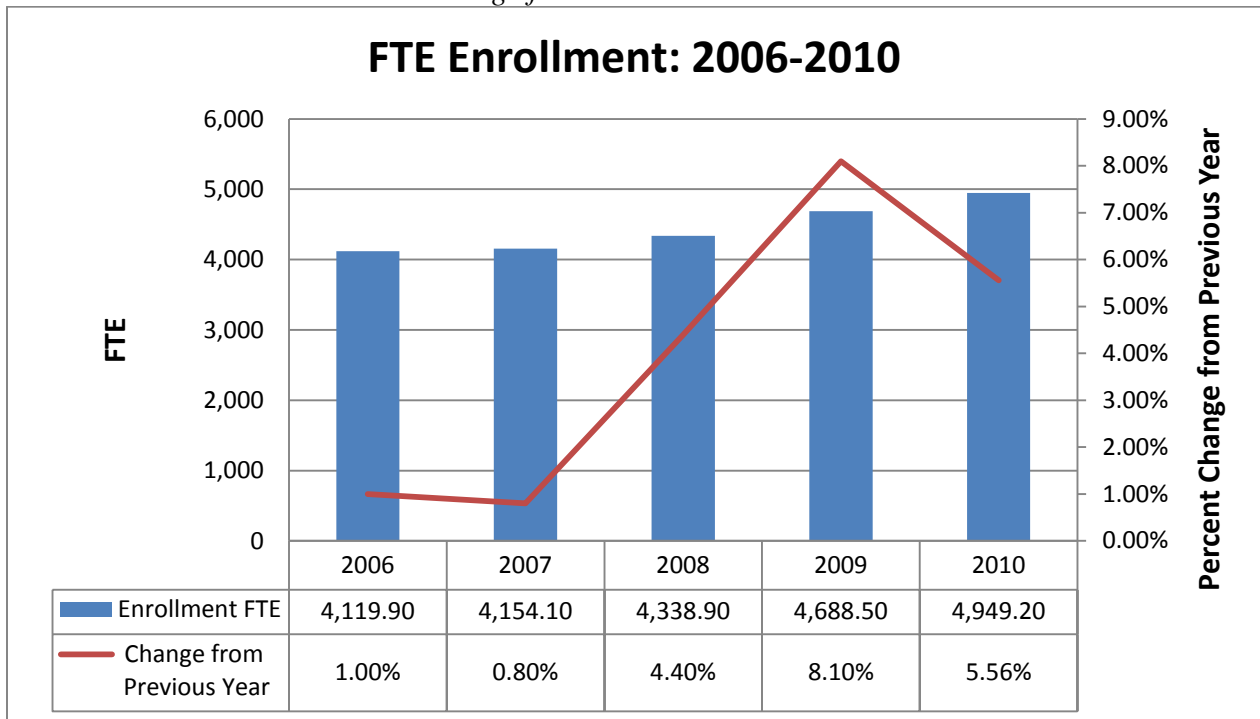
I. Institutional Profile: All Students

Figure 1: Enrollment Headcount and Percent Change from Previous Year



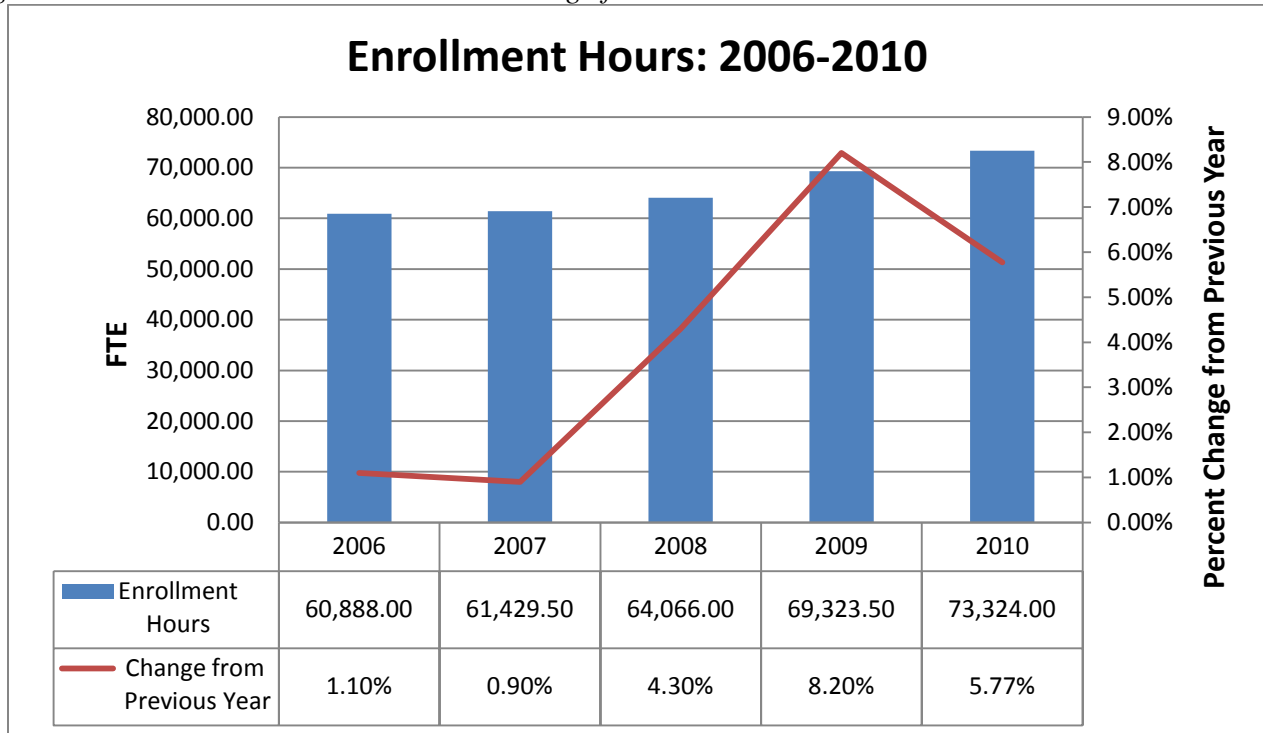
- Enrollment headcount has increased each year since 2006, with an increase of 5% between each of the last two years (Fall 2009 & Fall 2010). Overall, headcount has increased 16% since 2006.

Figure 2: Enrollment FTE and Percent Change from Previous Year



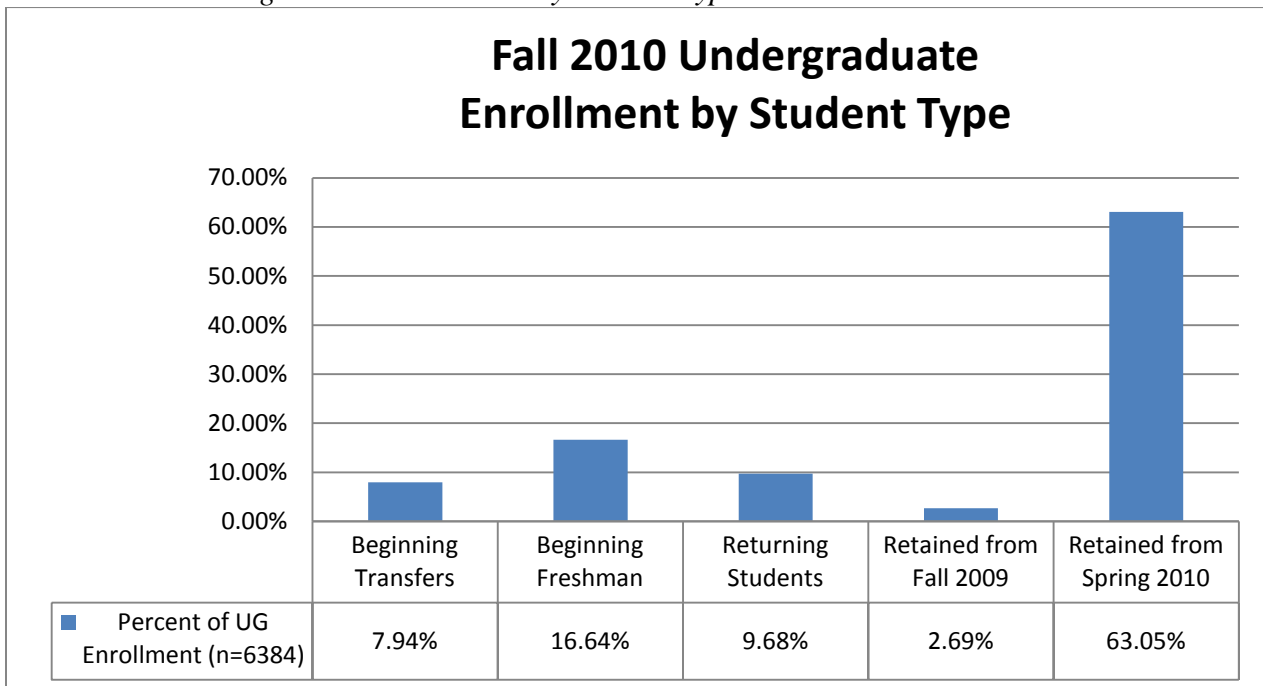
- Enrollment FTE has also increased each year since 2006, with an increase of more than five percent between 2009 and 2010. Overall, FTE has increased 20% since over the last 5 years.

- As with headcount and FTE, enrollment hours have increased each year since 2006, with an increase of nearly 6% between 2009 and 2010. Overall, hours have increased by 20% since 2006.

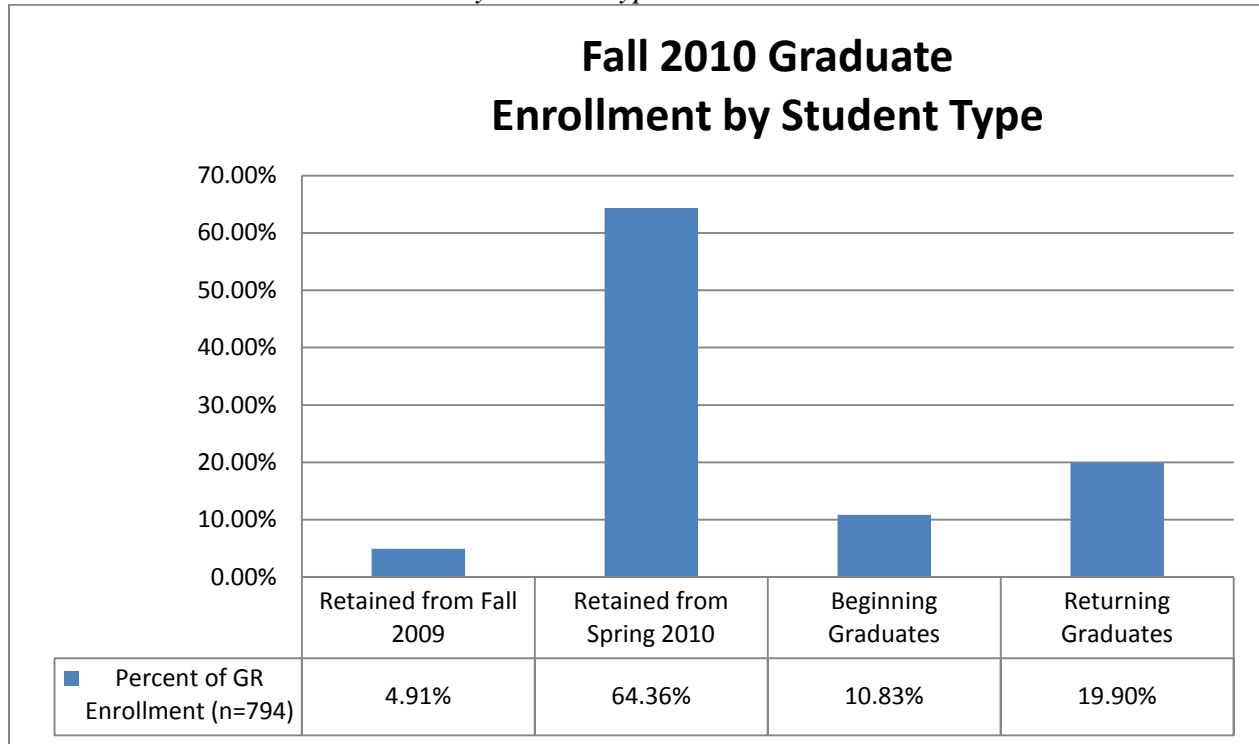
Figure 4: Fall 2010 Undergraduate Enrollment by Student Type

- Most students attending in Fall 2010 were retained from the previous spring term (63%). Some students (3%) attended in Fall 2009 but did not attend in Spring 2010.

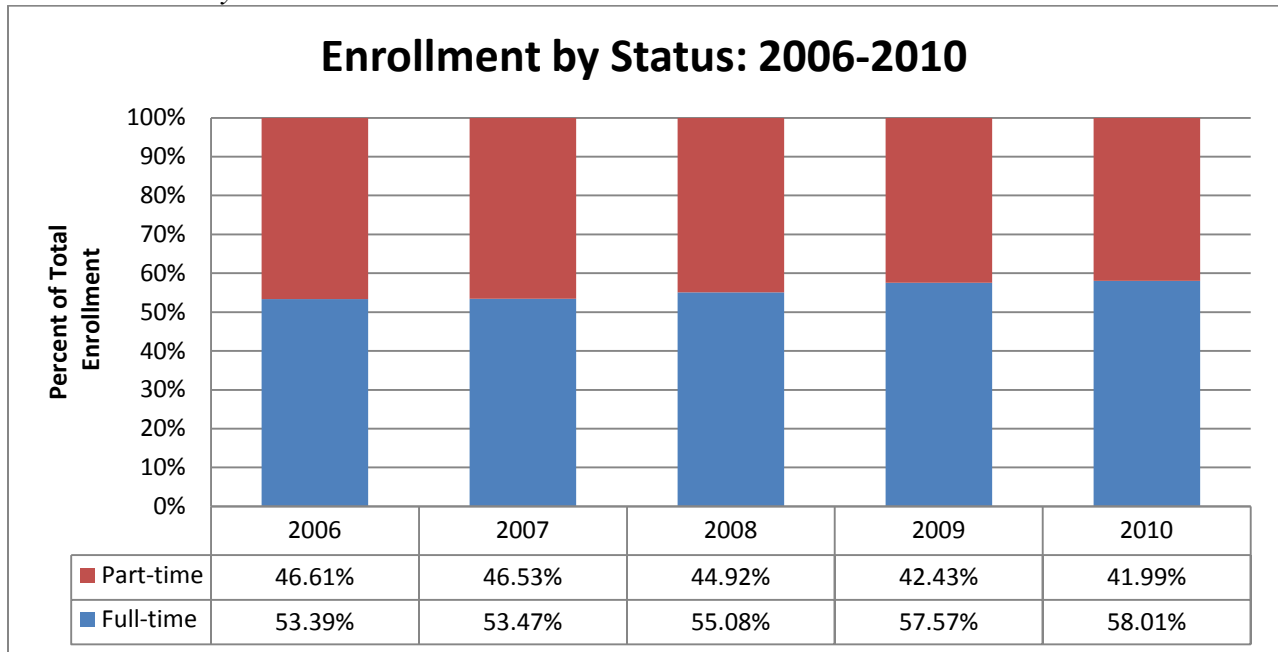
Figure 5: Fall 2010 Graduate Enrollment by Student Type



*NOTE: Returning students are defined as students not attending in Fall 2009 or Spring 2010 who are also not beginning graduate students.

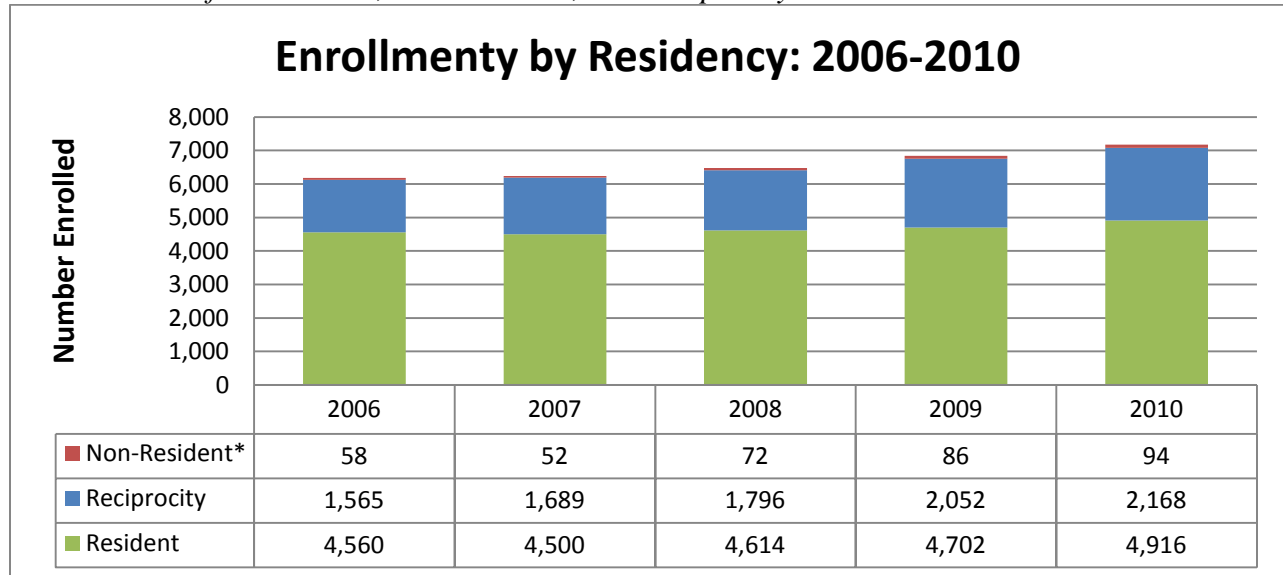

- In 2006, full-time students outnumbered part-time students by 7%. The ratio of full-time to part-time has grown steadily in favor of full-time students over the last five years, with 16% more full-time than part-time students enrolled in Fall 2010.

Figure 7: Enrollment for Residents, Non-residents, and Reciprocity Students



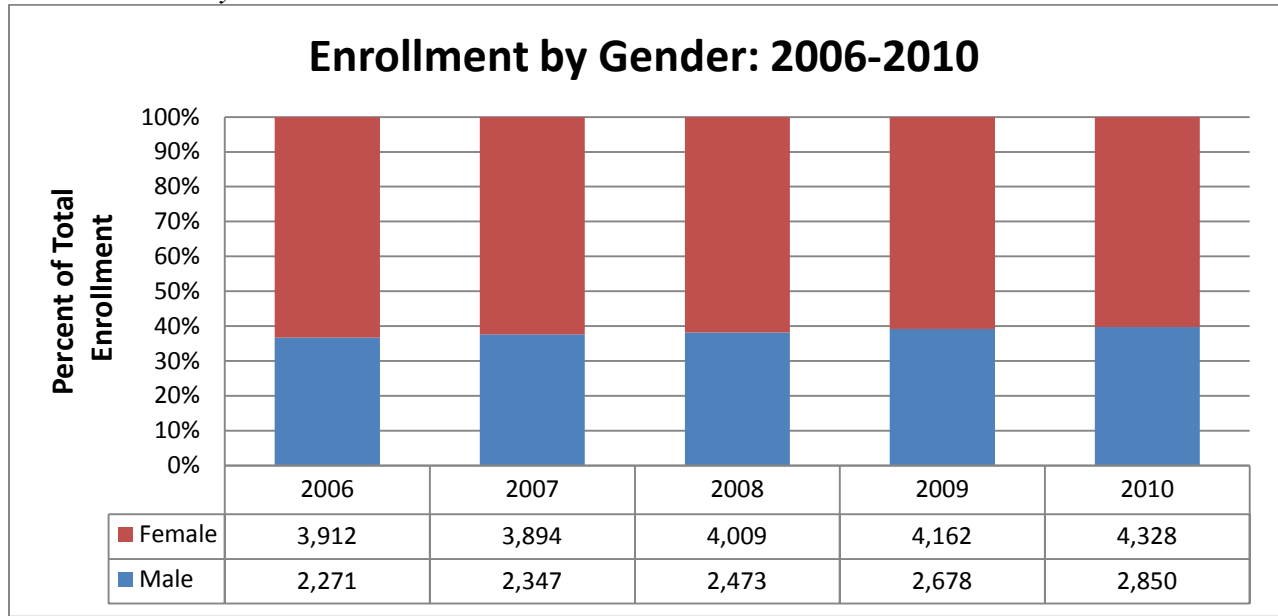

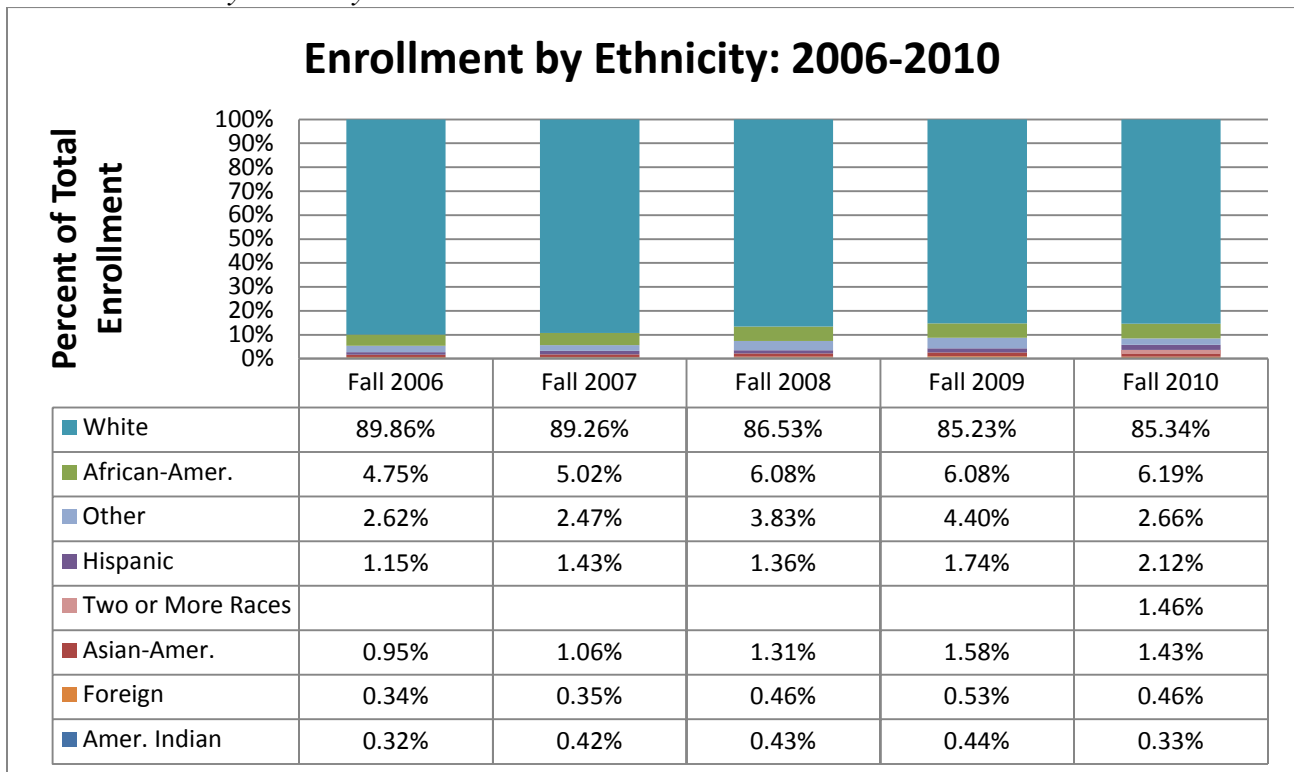
- In Fall 2010, 69% of undergraduate and 81% of graduate students lived in Clark (IN), Floyd (IN), or Jefferson (KY) county. Jefferson (KY) was the county of highest residence for graduate students (49%), while Clark (IN) was that of undergraduate students (24%).

Figure 8: Enrollment by Gender



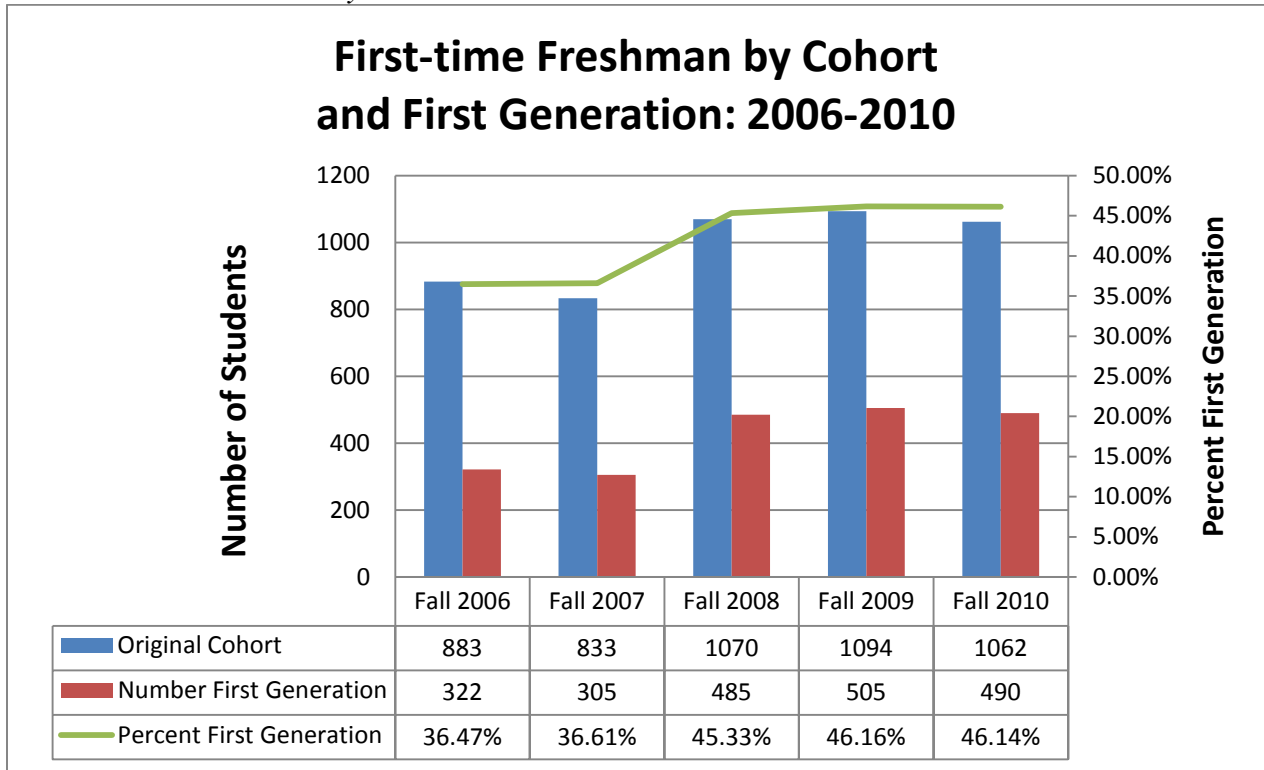
- Although the gender ratio has favored females for the last five years, the percentage of male students has gradually increased 3% during that time to make up 40% of the student body in Fall 2010.

Figure 9: Enrollment by Ethnicity



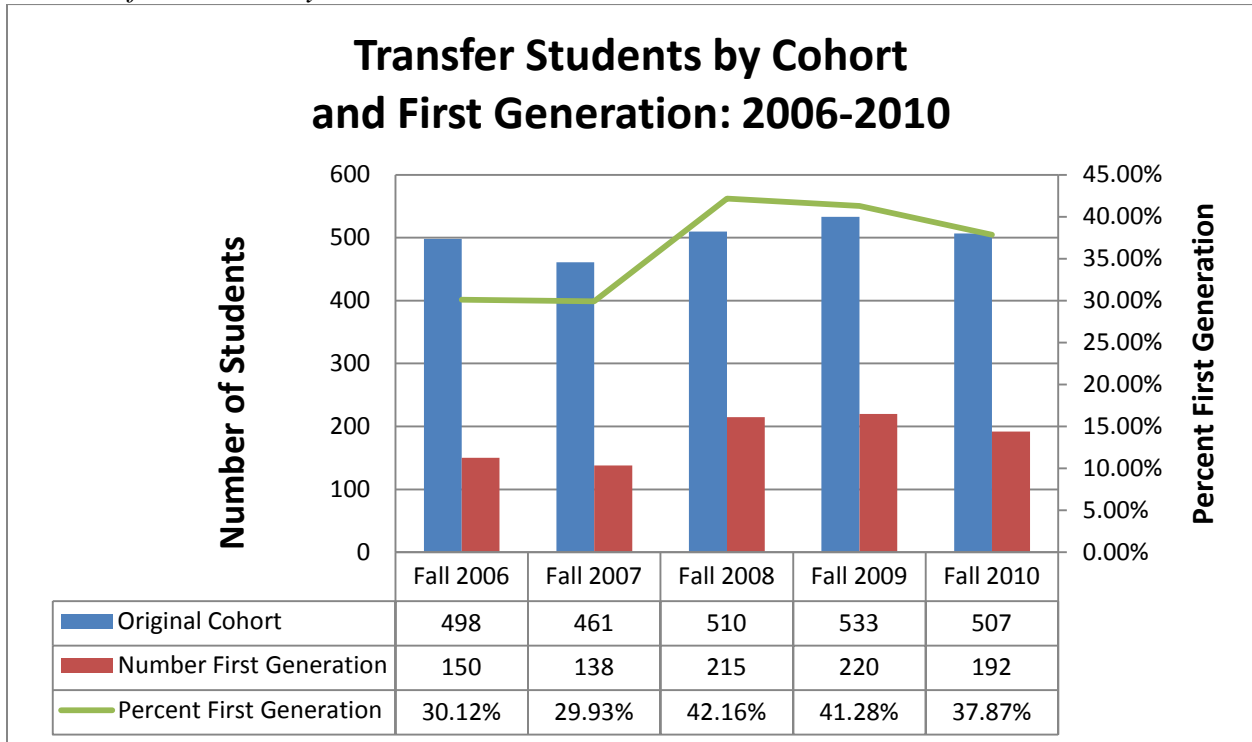
- The percentage of IU Southeast students who report white as their ethnicity has decreased nearly 5% since 2006. That decrease is accounted for by a nearly 2% increase in Hispanic students, a 1% increase in African American students, and slight increases in Asian American, and Foreign students. The addition of the “Two or More Races” category in 2010 accounts for the drop in “Other” students for Fall 2010.

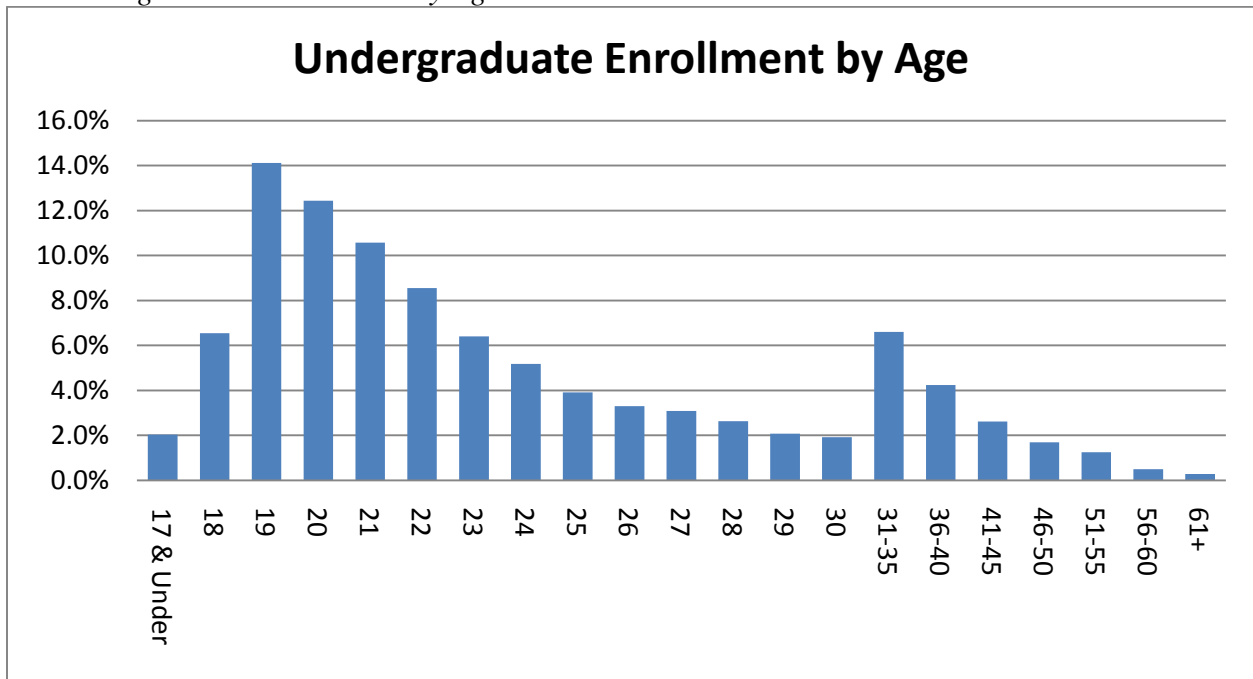

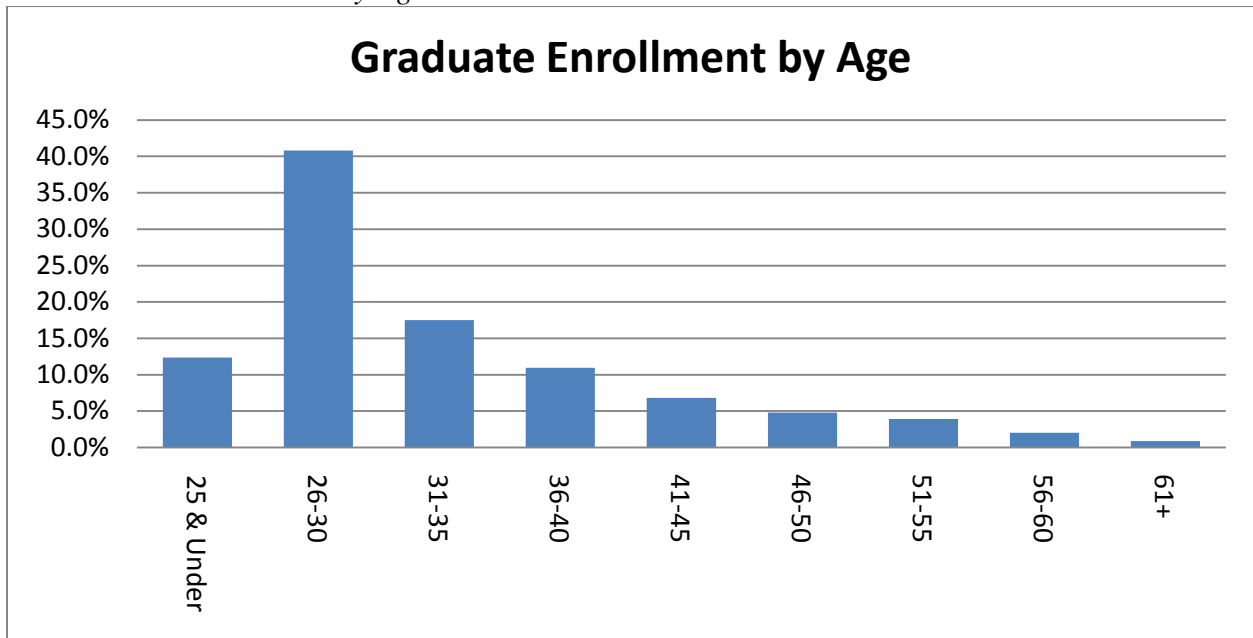
- In contrast to undergraduates, the majority (90%) of IU Southeast graduate students are enrolled part-time.

Figure 13: Graduate Enrollment by Age

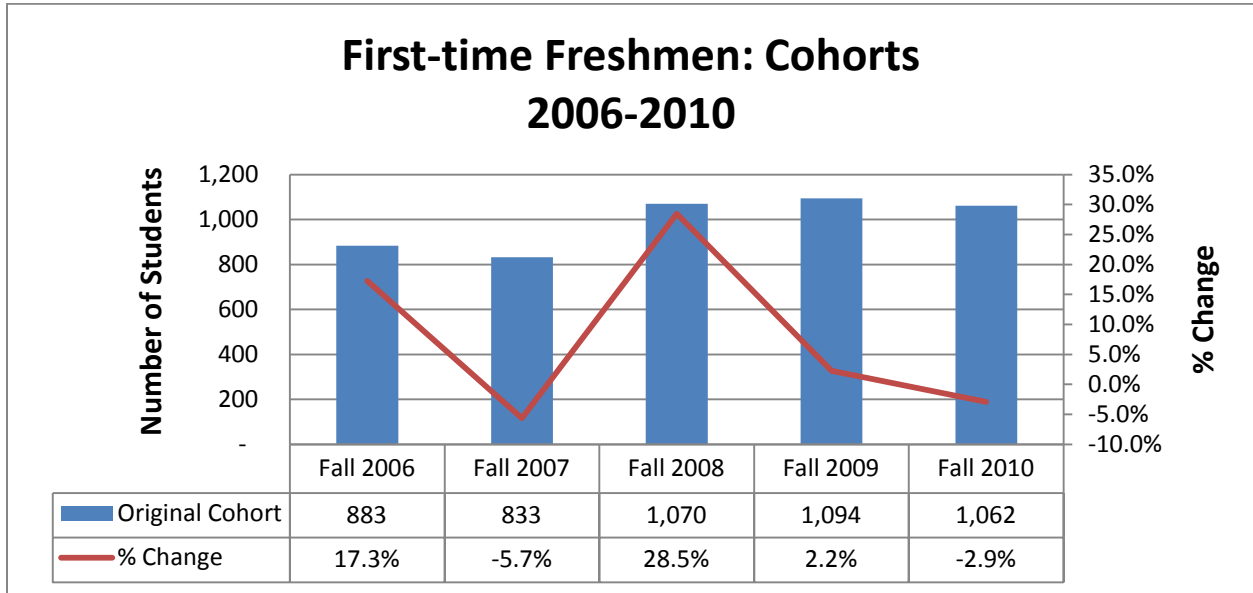


- In contrast to undergraduates, 52% of graduate students are over 30 years of age. Less than 15% are under age 25.

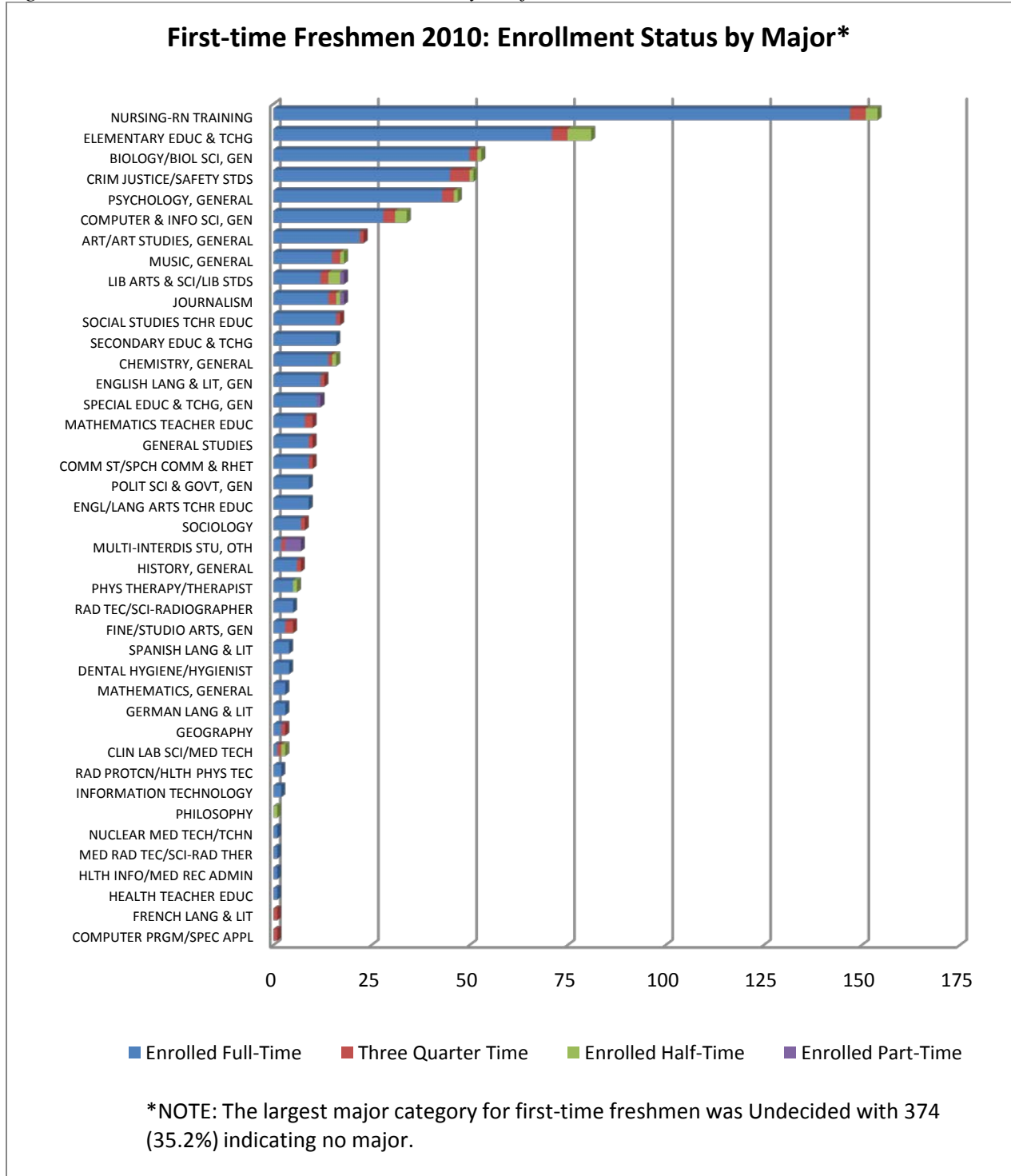
- Half of the 113 students who submitted scores from the ACT scored at least a 20 on the test, while another 39% scored in the 15 to 19 range.

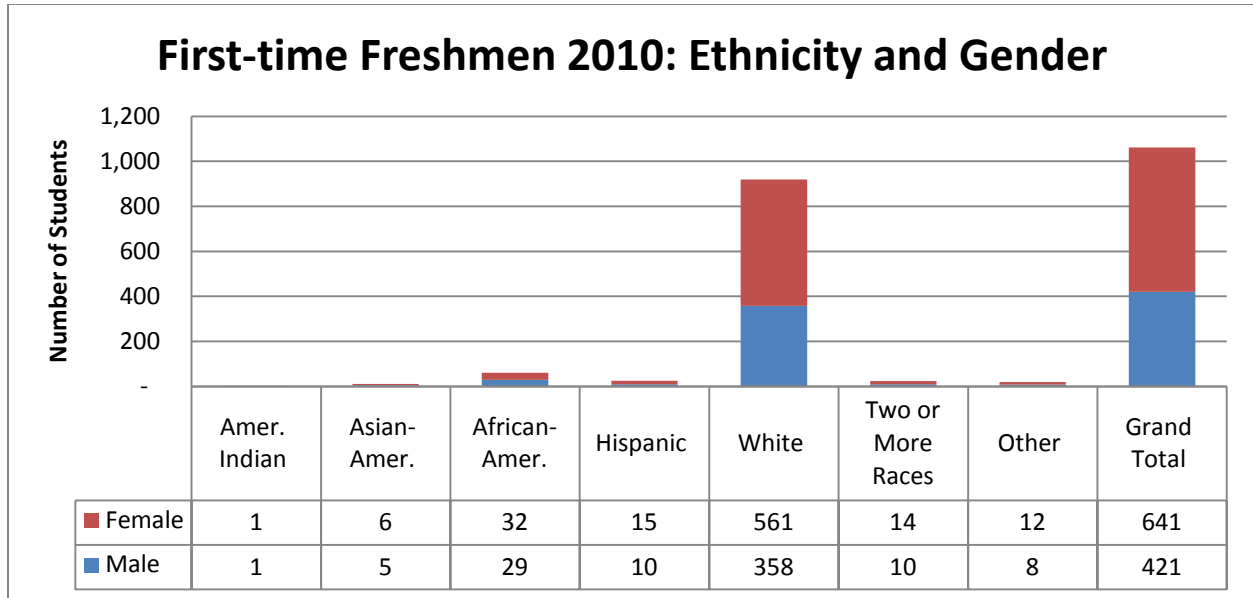

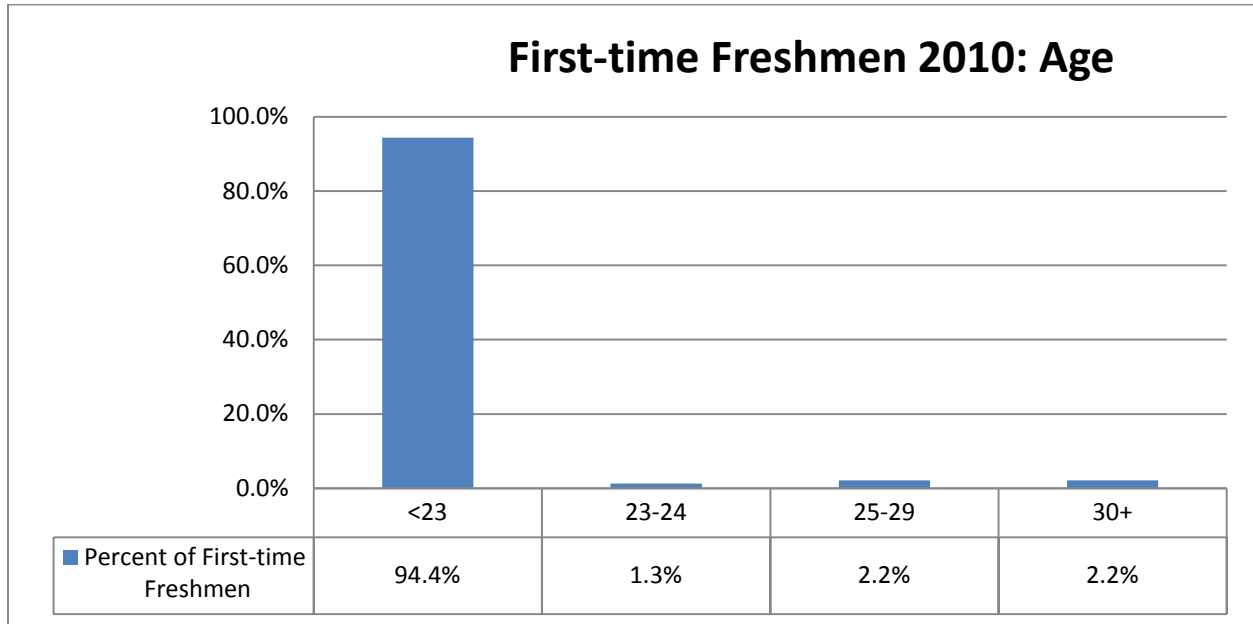

Figure 16: First-time Freshmen by Ethnicity and Gender



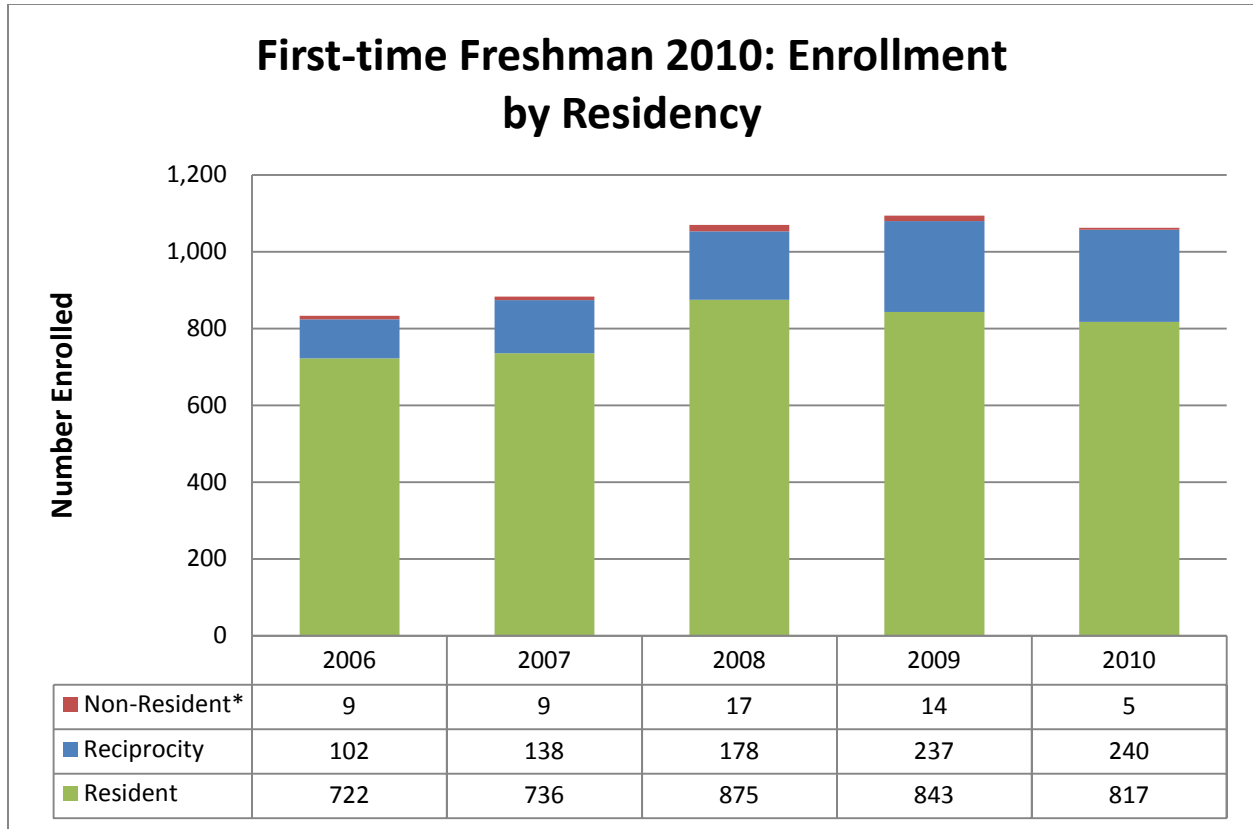
- Although females outnumber males for most ethnic groups, the disparity is much larger for African American students. Nearly 40% of white students are male, whereas only 22% of African American students are male.
