### SURVEY BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY

The Indiana University Southeast Alumni Survey was created in 2012 to obtain data necessary for the Office of Institutional Effectiveness (OIE), the Office of Development, and the Career Development Center. The instrument- found in Appendix A of this report- collects information pertaining to employment, graduate education, preparation for after college, perception of IU Southeast, satisfaction with the college experience, and updated contact information.

#### 2016

Respondents for the 2016 survey administration were drawn from institution records of degree recipients and included alumni from the following graduation classes:

- May 2015, August 2015 and December 2015 graduates (One year out)
- 2012-2013 graduates (Three years out)
- 2010-2011 graduates (Five years out; previously surveyed three years out in 2014)

Response rates of the various graduation classes are below. Further demographic details of the respondents are found in the original Alumni Survey reports on the OIE webpage.

Two thirds of all respondents earn between \$30,001 and \$70,000 per year, with fairly even distribution between the \$30k to \$40k, \$40k to \$50k and \$50k to \$70k ranges. Sixty-four percent of the respondents earning less than \$20k are one year out. The three years out have the largest percentage earning more than \$70k per year (18%), and the largest percentage earning more than \$110k per year (7%).

27. I graduated from the School of Natural Sciences in 2016. I would say I fell through the cracks, but I would guess there are a lot of students just like me. No man is an island. I'd like you to work on considering college as preparation for the work force and not just a place of education. Education is free on the Internet and in every library in the country. We need to be prepared for a future in the career paths we've studied. That was not my experience at IUS.
51. I was very pleased with my educational experiences at IU Southeast. If you offered a Master's In Library Science, I would most definitely return

52. I wish that IUS had a transition to teaching program for secondary education. I had to go to Taylor University for their program.
53. I wished that I was encouraged to stick with my program.
54. I would also like to see current students being made aware of the benefits of joining the Alumni Association earlier in their academic career, not just when they are getting ready to graduate. 
