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SURVEY BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY

The Indiana University Southeast Alumni Survey was created in 2012 to obtain data necessary for the Office of Institutional Effectiveness (OIE), the Office of Development, and the Career Development Center. The instrument- found in Appendix A of this report- collects information pertaining to employment, graduate education, preparation for after college, perception of IU Southeast, satisfaction with the college experience, and updated contact information.

Respondents for the 2017 survey administration were drawn from institution records of degree recipients and included alumni from the following graduation classes:

- May 2016, August 2016 and December 2016 graduates (One year out)
- 2013-2014 graduates (Three years out)
- 2011-2012 graduates (Five years out; previously surveyed three years out in 2015)

Response rates of the various graduation classes are below. Further demographic details of the respondents are found in the original Alumni Survey reports on the OIE webpage.

Since graduating from IU Southeast, 86% of responding alumni have accepted a full-time position.

Two thirds of all respondents earn between \$30,001 and \$70,000 per year, with fairly even distribution between the \$30k to \$40k, \$40k to \$50k and \$50k to \$70k ranges. Forty-six percent of the respondents earning less than \$20k are one year out. The five years out have the largest percentage earning more than \$70k per year (18%), and the largest percentage earning more than \$110k per year (5%).

QUALITATIVE COMMENTS: FURTHER COMMENTS

Respondents were asked for any further comments.

1. My experience at IU Southeast was extremely poor. I also feel as though I was lied to throughout the admissions process. I was told that my paper degree would have no reference to IU Southeast, only to Indiana University, and that I would select Indiana University as my undergraduate institution. However, my degree very clearly states Indiana University Southeast, and with the references required on graduate school applications as well as career interviews, I have had to disclose that it was indeed the satellite campus. Administrative staff is poorly trained and extremely rude. My advisor (who is no longer employed at the university) had no clue what she was doing (signed me up for a class I already had credit for) and caused me to add an additional semester onto my college experience. I feel as though a majority of the lecturers and professors (with a few exceptions such as Dr. Ambrose, Professor Zink, and Dr. Staten, who are all absolutely wonderful and extremely knowledgeable) are not experts in their fields and have poor teaching strategies.

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2. I loved attending this university and would recommend it to many.
3. IUS has a quality university-life that was flexible to accommodate my busy schedule and other "activities". Work, family, etc.
4. My main issue with IUS is that I feel as if the university did not prepare me well for furthering education. I am currently in medical school for podiatry and I truly believe that my education at IUS did not adequately prepare me for this field. I feel that IUS taught me how to memorize and cram for exams and not truly learn material, and the issues that I am facing here in medical school is that I not only have to truly learn the material but I also have to do it at a break-neck pace. I graduated IUS with a 3.7 GPA, and in medical school I have a 2.8 GPA currently. I also performed very poorly on the MCAT, and I know that many other students from IUS have had similar scores to mine. / I am not at all saying that I believe that I have received a poor education at IUS, I just do not think that IUS prepared me for furthering education specifically in medicine. I did really enjoy my time at IUS. I think IUS has a strong community, I really enjoyed the student/professor connections that I made, and the small classroom setting. I just think that for students who want to further their education (specifically in medicine) IUS just does not prepare them well. / Also, the premed advice that I received from the premed advisers and normal advisers was really poor. I am by no means saying that this is the advisers faults, I think they are just very poorly informed on the subject. Not one of the advisers even knew what podiatry was, not to mention the various other options that one could do that is not the tradition M.D. path. Also, I think some of their key points on what you should focus on is a little off kilter as well. GPA is very important, but volunteering, getting experience in the field, and various other activities behind your belt is also very important as well. But most importantly, the MCAT makes or breaks you. If you do not do well enough (actually, if you don't score relatively high) on the MCAT you will not get into traditional medical school, you may get into other medical programs but not to an M.D. school; and to be fair this was a point that an adviser informed me of before I took the MCAT.

It became clear to me quite fast that my degree had not qualified me for any career that exists, and that I will now have to teach myself industry knowledge in my free time in order to obtain a position to begin my career. I have been a graduate for two years, and am currently on track to begin a career in my preferred field within one to three years. If I had known I would not be able to obtain gainful employment upon graduation, I would not have ever begun a traditional educational route, as I now must repay thousands of dollars in debt for a degree with little to no tangible rewards. I do not regret the education that I received, but the payoff for this education is severely lacking, while the burden is somewhat overwhelming. I now make the same salary I did before graduation, but with the loans to pay off, I am effectively making ~10% less.


